

2023 Selective Prevention and Control Program for European Rabbit (Oryctolagus cuniculus) under the Biosecurity Act 2014

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1. Biosecurity program

1.1 Program name

The prevention and control program for European Rabbits (*Oryctolagus cuniculus*) will be known as the 2023 Darling Downs-Moreton Rabbit Board Selective Prevention and Control Program.

2. Requirement for a prevention and control program

2.1 Purpose and rationale

Significant biosecurity risk

The *Biosecurity Act 2014* (the Act) provides for the establishment of prevention and control programs. Prevention and control programs are directed at any of the following—

- (a) preventing the entry, establishment or spread of biosecurity matter in an area that poses a significant biosecurity risk;
- (b) managing, reducing or eradicating any biosecurity matter in an area that could pose a significant biosecurity risk.

The objectives of the 2023 Darling Downs-Moreton Rabbit Board Selective Prevention and Control Program (the Program) are:

- 1. Prevention of new populations of European rabbits from developing;
- 2. Removing identified European rabbit populations; and
- 3. Educating the community on the importance of removing rabbit harbour to reduce European rabbit breeding.

2.2 Measures that are required to achieve the purpose

The key activities that may be undertaken by the Program include but are not limited to:

- 1. Undertaking direct rabbit control activities such as harbour removal, baiting Prógrams and trapping;
- 2. Warren and harbour destruction and removal, with the Board reserving the right to undertake activities on a fee for service or cost recovery basis;
- 3. Educating stakeholders on rabbit control measures on land under their control;
- 4. Enforcing control measures where property owners are not effectively controlling rabbits on their property; and
- 5. Working collaboratively with other stakeholders in controlling European rabbits.

2.3 Powers of Authorised Officers

Entry of place

The Act provides that authorised officers appointed under the Act may, at reasonable times, enter a place situated in an area to which a biosecurity program applies, to take any action authorised by the biosecurity program¹. These activities must be done in a timely and efficient manner to ensure that the measures are as effective as possible. The Program will authorise entry into places to allow these measures to be undertaken.

In accordance with the Act a reasonable attempt will be made to locate an occupier² and obtain the occupier's consent to the entry prior to an authorised officer entering a place to undertake activities under the Program. Nevertheless, an authorised officer may enter the place if³—

- (a) The authorised officer is unable to locate an occupier after making a reasonable attempt to do so; or
- (b) The occupier refuses to consent to the entry.

If after entering a place an authorised officer finds an occupier present or the occupier refuses to consent to the entry—an authorised officer will make reasonable attempts to produce an identity card for inspection and inform the occupier of the reason for entering and the authorisaton under the Act to enter without the permission of the occupier. An authorised officer under the Program must make a reasonable attempt to inform the occupier of any steps taken, or to be taken, and if steps have been taken or are to be taken, that it is an offence to do anything that interferes with a step taken or to be taken.

An authorised officer must leave a notice in a conspicuous position and in a reasonably secure way. This notice must state the date and time of entry and information addressing the reason for entry, authorisation to enter a place and the steps undertaken by the authorised officer after entry.

Giving a direction under a prevention and control program

Section 237 of the Act provides that an authorised officer may, at a reasonable time and at a place within an area to which a prevention and control program applies:

- direct an occupier to take reasonable steps⁴, within a stated and reasonable timeframe, to remove or eradicate European rabbits.
- Destroy European rabbits or a carrier of European rabbits, if that authorised officer believes on reasonable grounds that they pose a significant biosecurity risk.

Failure to comply with a direction

Under section 238 of the Act, occupiers of a place are obligated to comply with an authorised officer's direction issued under section 237 of the Act, as outlined above.

Power to carry out aerial controls measures

The power to carry out aerial control measures is authorised by a biosecurity program under the Act⁵.

Obligations

Occupiers of a place are required to provide any assistance to an authorised officer as may be required pursuant to Section 297 of the *Biosecurity Act (2014)*.

In addition to Program specific obligations in the prevention and control program authorisation, under section 238 of the Act, occupiers of a place are obligated to comply with an authorised officer's direction issued under section 237 of the Act.

General powers of authorised officers

Nothing in the Program or its associated Authorisation limits the powers of authorised officers under Chapter 10 of the Act.

2.4 Consultation

The following parties were consulted in the development of this plan:

- 1. Relevant State government departments and agencies;
- 2. Local Governments who contribute to the DDMRB component of the Land Protection Fund.

3. Authorisation of a prevention and control program in the Darling Downs-Moreton Rabbit Board operational area

AUTHORISATION STATEMENT

By resolution dated 16 December 2022, the Darling Downs-Moreton Rabbit Board (the DDMRB) acting pursuant to section 235 of the *Biosecurity Act 2014* (the Act), has authorised the Darling Downs-Moreton Rabbit Board Selective Prevention and Control Program (the Program) in the DDMRB operational area on the basis that the DDMRB is satisfied that:

- There are identified European rabbit populations, which are a Category 3,4,5 and 6 restricted
 matter, as identified in the *Biosecurity Act 2014*, in the DDMRB operational area and these
 populations present a significant biosecurity risk in the area.
- The DDMRB is authorised to take action to implement control measures to mitigate the risk posed by European rabbits in the DDMRB operational area by:
 - a) Maintaining the rabbit barrier fence in a servicable standard to prevent the spread of further Eurorpean rabbit populations from the south into the DDMRB operational area;
 - b) Working collaboratively with landholders to assist them to effectively carry out the statutory obligation to manage pests on their land;
 - c) Enforcing compliance with regulatory obligations regarding the management of rabbits in the DDMRB operational area;
 - d) Working collaboratively with other agencies and stakeholders to control and eradicate European rabbits from the DDMRB operational area; and,
 - e) Ensuring that all control measures are conducted humanely and in an environmentally responsible manner.
- The DDMRB has passed an appropriate resolution at the Board meeting held 16 December 2022.

Proposed Resolution

THAT the Board authorise the following Biosecurity Programs for 1 January 2023 to 31 December 2023:

- Darling Downs-Moreton Rabbit Board Selective Surveillance Program
- Darling Downs-Moreton Rabbit Board Selective Prevention and Control Program

3.1 Biosecurity matter

The biosecurity matter to which the Program relates is the European rabbit (Oryctolagus cuniculus).

3.2 Purpose of the Program

The purpose of the Program is to:

- 1. Prevent new populations of European rabbits from developing;
- 2. Remove identified European rabbit populations; and
- 3. Educate the community on the importance of removing rabbit harbour to reduce European rabbit breeding.

3.3 Area affected by the Program

The Program applies to the Darling Downs-Moreton Rabbit Board (DDMRB) operational area (Figure 1).



3.4 Powers of Authorised Officers

An authorised officer of the Program appointed under the *Biosecurity Act 2014*, may enter a place—other than a residence⁶—without a warrant and without the occupier's consent^{7 8}. An authorised officer can exercise the powers of an authorised officer under the Act in relation to the Program, if the authorised officer is appointed by the DDMRB⁹.

An authorised officer may make a requirement (a *help requirement*) of an occupier of the place or a person at the place to give the authorised officer reasonable help to exercise a general power¹⁰.

An authorised officer may carry out, or direct another person to carry out, aerial control measures for European rabbits in relation to a place. Under the Program these measures include the use of drones for harbour identification.

An authorised officer has general powers after entering a place to do any of the following¹¹:

• the owner of the biosecurity matter or carrier consents to its destruction

Remain at the place for the time necessary to achieve the purpose of the entry

The authorised officer may take a necessary step to allow the exercise of a general power

If the authorised officer takes a document from the place to copy it, the authorised officer must copy and return the document to the place as soon as practicable

If the authorised officer takes from the place an article or device reasonably capable of producing a document from an electronic document to produce the document, the authorised officer must produce the document and return the article or device to the place as soon as practicable.

Undertake preventative treatment such as

- Warren Destruction
- Harbour Removal
- Warren Fumigation
- Baiting
- Barrier Fencing

Pursuant to section 237 of the Act an authorised officer may also give a direction to an occupier of a place located in the area to which the Program applies to take reasonable steps to:

- remove or eradicate European rabbits, as reasonably necessary to achieve the purposes of the Program
- remove or fence off harbour that may facilitate the establishment or re-establishment of a rabbit population

3.5 Obligations imposed on a person under the Program

The following obligations may be imposed on a person who is an occupier of a place to which the Program relates:

- a) Destroy rabbit warrens on property
- b) Remove rabbit harbour
- c) Burn timber stacks
- d) Clear noxious weeds harbouring rabbits
- e) Fence off a place where a warren can be developed
- f) Fumigate a warren
- g) Bait rabbit population or participate in a baiting program
- h) Trap rabbits
- i) Shoot rabbits

3.6 Commencement and duration of the Program

The Program will commence on 1 January 2023 and continue until 31 December 2023. The duration of the program is considered to be reasonably necessary to achieve the Program's purpose.

3.7 Consultation with relevant parties

As required by the Act¹⁵, the Chief Executive Officer of the DDMRB has consulted, prior to the authorisation of the Program, with the Chief Executive, Department of Agriculture and Fisheries and relevant Local Governments, being:

- City of Gold Coast
- Logan City Council
- Ipswich City Council
- Lockyer Valley Regional Council
- Western Downs Regional Council
- Southern Downs Regional Council
- Toowoomba Regional Council
- Scenic Rim Regional Council

3.8 Notification of relevant parties of requirements

As required by the Act¹⁶, the Chief Executive Officer of the DDMRB will give public notice of the Program 14 days before the Program starts by:

- giving the notice to each government department or government owned corporation responsible for land in the area to which the Program relates; and
- publishing the notice on the DDMRB website.

From the start of the Program, the Authorisation for the Program (and the Program) will be available for inspection or purchase ¹⁷ at the DDMRB office at 26 Wood Street, Warwick Qld 4370.
